

Who we work with

In 2022, LWF Kenya-Somalia supported more than **451,000** Persons of Concern (PoC).



- **351,000** Refugees (78%)
- 100,000 local population (22%)

"I walked for almost three days in the heat; it was excruciating. I almost went mad, but God has been with me throughout my journey. I left behind every single thing I owned; my only worry was if I would ever make it to a safer place."

Hawa Barawe Ali is a 65-year-old woman from Jubbaland who was displaced by the extreme drought in Somalia. She lost 60 cows and 50 goats, leaving her with nothing. She found shelter in the camps for internally displaced persons (IDP) near Kismayo town where LWF provides them with food assistance.

Our impact

LWF Kenya-Somalia's work relies on three strategic areas of intervention: Livelihoods, Quality Services, Protection and Social Cohesion. Additionally, the program focuses on Gender and Climate Justice as particular areas to increase its impact, as well as Human Rights and Advocacy.

92,375 children were enrolled in 56 schools in Kakuma and Dadaab Refugee Camps
20,758 refugees and asylum seekers benefited from the Reception Center and services at the Kakuma and Kalobeyei reception centres.
3000 individuals were supported with a monthly food basket worth \$100 in Somalia



PROTECTION & SOCIAL COHESION

37,266 young people in camps and host communities participated in talent search and nurturing, sports and mentorship and counselling initiatives

2,491 children with disabilities accessed equal education and community-based rehabilitation services in Somalia



LIVELIHOODS

24,871 individuals gained access to water for domestic, livestock and agricultural needs in Kakuma.
