#### 2. Background information:

Somalia humanitarian situation continues to worsen due to multiple challenges emanating from protracted insecurity, natural disaster exposing millions of Somalia population to poverty and displacement.

The frequency of natural disasters notably drought has increased both in intensity and frequency. There are 1.3 million displaced by drought alone between 2021 to 2023 in Somalia and the numbers continues to rise by the day.

These climates induced crises had disrupted the communities' livelihoods making peoples life unbearable as livestock die due to lack of water, pasture. Rainfed farms also dried up due to lack of water for crop production.

These multi-faceted and compounding shocks have disrupted the livelihoods of vulnerable and poor households, particularly marginalized households and communities with minority affiliations in rural areas. The erosion of their livelihoods and overstretched social support systems have led to widening food consumption gaps and exhaustion of last-resort coping mechanisms. The drought has devastated the agriculture sector, which accounts for up to 60 per cent of Somalia's Gross Domestic Product, 80 per cent of its total employment, and 90 per cent of its exports.

To cope up with the ravaging climate related disasters, the displaced and affected communities have been displaced from their ancestral land and in to IDP camps. Subsequently, affected communities have resorted to negative coping mechanisms to provide food and shelter for their households including charcoal burning etc. Humanitarian assistance continues to provide lifeline opportunity for their survival and protection.

Jubaland state where this project is being implemented is one of the worst drought-hit states in Somalia. Over 4,700 drought displaced households (approx. 30,000 people) arrived Luglow Settlement (15km north of Kismayo town). These families have no access to safe, drinking water sanitation facilities and improved hygiene practices. In this regard LWF under priority area (3) is carrying out climate vulnerability and livelihood programming impact assessment to achieve a climate responsive and resilient communities in Somalia.

## 3. General Project description

This project will be implemented in Jubbaland State of Federal Government of Somalia mainly in Kismayu (Calanley, Fanole, Farjana, Gulwada, Midnimo) and Dhobley (Kutur, Tula Barwaqa and Degelema). The project will further have interventions targeting the 'on the 'move' Somali population either from Dadaab, Somalia or vice versa.

The main project participants shall be the Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs), returnees, Somali migrants and populations on the move, some of the less advantaged local communities both rural and urban-based, and the ethnic minorities who suffer a high risk of vulnerabilities with a focus on women and girls, PWD/CWDs, and youth. At least 26,500 (16,600F, 9,900M out of which 2,580 are persons with disabilities -PWDs) people will be reached directly through this project. Other key stakeholders include community leaders and duty bearers.

The goal of this project is to contribute to the enhanced resilience and social cohesion among Somali communities in Dadaab, Dhobley, and Kismayu. To achieve the overall goal, LWF and AFSC designed interventions that work towards the realization of the following three key outcome objectives: (i) Communities' social cohesion and community-based psychosocial support is enhanced, (ii) The enforcement of 'women's and girls' fundamental rights to education and protection against gender-based violence are enhanced, and (iii) Target community's livelihood opportunities are enhanced. AFSC is in charge of implementing activities that relate to specific objectives (i), while LWF works for specific objectives (ii) and (iii).



# World Servic **4**. Consultancy assigning institution

The Lutheran World Federation (LWF) is an international humanitarian organization that has global presence in countries Africa, Asia, Europe, and Central America. The global headquarters of LWF is in Geneva, Switzerland. At the regional level, LWF is headquartered in Nairobi Kenya to serve both the Kenya and Somalia country programs.

Besides the above three major priority areas, LWF provides other life-saving humanitarian assistance occasioned by natural disasters (drought, floods, etc.) through quick impact projects in its areas of operations.

The Lutheran World Federation (LWF) World Service Kenya Somalia Program established presence in Kismayu, Jubbaland State in Somalia in 2017 in order to create a continuum between its refugee assistance and protection program in Dadaab refugee camps, Kenya, and Kismayu, Somalia. From 2017 to date, LWF has been working closely with the relevant Jubbaland State Ministries including Ministry of Education and Higher Learning (MoEHL), Ministry of women, family affairs and human right, ministry of humanitarian affairs. #### 5. Assessment Goal and Objectives

#### 5.1 Assessment Goal

The goal of the assessment is to study the impact of climate vulnerability on the livelihood opportunities and design climate friendly livelihood options for the communities in the targeted areas.

#### 5.2 Assessment specific objectives.

- Assess climate change risks and vulnerabilities of the targeted areas
- Analyze the impact of climate change on the livelihood activities of the target groups, with especial focus on ethnic minorities, women and girls, PWD/CWDs, and youth.
- Recommend appropriate climate friendly livelihoods programming activities in the targeted areas which are sustainable and promote positive coping mechanisms.

N/B: The designed and recommended approaches in this assessment will be validated with the relevant government departments and units for institutionalization.

6. Scope of the Assessment.

The scope of the assessment entails study on the specific objectives as stipulated under 5.2 above. 1.Geographical areas: LWFs specific areas of operation; Kismayu & Dobley.

#### 7. Proposed Assessment methodology:

The consultant will propose a methodology that will be participatory, comprising a mixture of quantitative and qualitative methods, and that will include the following elements and among others: –

- i. Desk Review
- ii. Interviews with key community members
- iii. Meetings/interviews with development actors (Ministries, Local Authorities, INGOs)
- iv. Field Visits and interviews to sample beneficiaries
- v. Data collection and analysis
- vi. Report Writing

#### 8. Reporting and accountability

The primary responsibility for this assignment lies with the LWF Project Coordinator and Livelihood officer under the overall guidance of the LWF team leader Somalia program who will provide overall technical oversight and guidance.

#### LWF will be responsible for;

- i. Provide the consultant with all necessary project documentation.
- ii. Review the assessment inception report.
- iii. Quality assurance of the assessment process.
- iv. Support the consultant with stakeholders' mobilization
- v. Review the draft report and provide feedbacks to the consultant.
- vi. Organize meetings on the presentation of key findings and data validation.
- vii. Review and approve finalized assessment report.

#### The Consultant shall;

- i. Submit technical and financial proposals, and all other relevant documentations
- ii. Submit Inception report: detailing the methodology including the main research methods, the sampling framework, proposed sources of data, procedures for data collection and analysis, and detailed table of contents. The proposed research tools will be reviewed and approved by the livelihood officer before data collection commences.
- iii. Train enumerators, guide and supervise enumerators during data collection in the field.
- iv. Lead in the data collection process through monitoring, verifying, cleaning and data collection.
- v. Draft the assessment report and incorporate feedback, from LWF team.
- vi. Make a power point presentation on the findings during a validation forum to be organized by LWF staff.
- vii. Submit a final report to LWF as per the dates indicated on the suggested schedule below;
  - a) Assess climate change risks and vulnerabilities of the targeted areas
  - b) Analyze the impact of climate change on the livelihood activities of the target groups, with especial focus on ethnic minorities, women and girls, PWD/CWDs, and youth.



Recommend appropriate climate friendly livelihoods programming activities in the targeted areas which are sustainable and promote positive coping mechanisms.

# **10. Required Qualifications and Experience**

- iv. Samples (two) of previous work relevant to the assignment (in English).

- vi. Rates should be in US Dollars.
- vii. The Budget must be inclusive of all related costs such as data collection costs, travel-related costs (international and local flights, visa, and in-country where applicable).
